The Rabbi's Study

This week, for the first time in my rabbinate, I led a Passover seder in a correctional facility. The chaplain at the Strafford County Department of Corrections facility told me recently that two inmates had asked for some type of celebration of Passover. I was told that I could bring matzah, grape juice, a seder plate and a haggadah, and I received permission to bring in my "travel" guitar as well. On the morning of March 31, before I left Temple, I emptied out my pockets (as I usually do when I go to meetings of the Spiritual Advisory committee there), taking only my driver's license holder and my keys (car and Temple only). I was able to find my way through the right doors and stairs to get to the unit where I was set to do

my seder. The two inmates joined me for many of the regular prayers. We chanted the Kiddush. We sang Mah Nish-tanah, Avadim Hayinu, Dayeinu and Eliyahu Hanavi. We poured drops for the ten plagues. We ate matzah and, in the absence of charoset, we dipped our matzah in our grape juice. We created, for a few moments, a microcosm of the worldwide Jewish community marking Passover as a festival of freedom, with the hope that these two men would be able to enjoy actual individual freedom as soon as possible. I left the jail, returned to Temple, put my wallet, my Blackberry, my full set of keys, and my card case back into my pockets. I was back to the normal realm of freedom, but I knew that we had created a momentary "pocket" of liberty in the jail through the prayers and practices we shared.

I also want to mention that our prayers continue to be with our seventh grade student Emma Jacobs, who is still in the pediatric intensive care unit at Massachusetts General Hospital. Emma joined our Religious School this year, adding her

commitment and knowledge to our seventh grade community. She is slowly progressing in her recovery, and our prayers and expressions of concern, even from a distance, offer welcome and crucial help and support.

This month of celebrations and commemorations focuses on the importance of using our freedom to create positive and productive community life to foster understanding and peace throughout the world. May we keep these goals in mind in the days to come!

University of New Hampshire
“Echoes of the Holocaust”

April 16-18, 2010—UNH Opera
April 16 and 17, 8 p.m., and April 18, 2010, 3 p.m., Bratton Recital Hall, Paul Creative Arts Center

UNH’s Opera Workshop, directed by David Ripley, begins with settings of passages from The Diary of Anne Frank and concludes with Viktor Ullmann’s Der Kaiser von Atlantis, a one-act chamber opera written in the Theresienstadt concentration camp. The grotesque character the Emperor of Atlantis, whose goal was a state of perpetual war, was a courageous satire of Adolf Hitler. Ullmann died in the gas chambers in Auschwitz-Birkenau.

April 28, 2010—UNH Wind Symphony and UNH Concert Band -8 p.m., Johnson Theatre, Paul Creative Arts Center

Andrew Boysen conducts the Wind Symphony and Casey Goodwin conducts the Concert Band in this concert that premieres compositions by two UNH graduate alumni composers and an arrangement written by a master’s student. Timothy Miles, ’07, director of bands at Exeter High School, composed if this is a man, inspired by Primo Levi’s book about his year in Auschwitz. Thomas Bourgault, ’06, director of bands at Norwich (CT) Free Academy, composed The Island of Obsession, a piece that explores themes of obsession and atonement and incorporates the Jewish prayer melody “Kol Nidre.” Other works on the program include Jack Stamp’s Scenes from Terezin, as well as an arrangement by graduate student Becky Noyes. Noyes is arranging several movements of Lawrence Siegel’s Kad-dish for the Wind Symphony with soloist David Ripley.

MY FATHER’S WORDS: LET THE HOUSES BE THE WITNESSES
A twenty-two piece installation by Kathi Kouguell with the Aliento Chamber Players performing Quartet for the End of Time by Olivier Messiaen, April 10 at 7:30 pm at Stratham Community Church

MY FATHER’S WORDS: LET THE HOUSES BE THE WITNESSES is inspired by, and incorporates the text of, a letter written by the artist’s father, Anton Gfroerer. Chronicling the artist’s family’s journey, sections of the text are combined with collages under glass, and freestanding wood/paper structures. This 1963 letter poignantly details their harrowing experiences during World War II, including the atrocities of Kristallnacht, the artist’s mother attempt to rescue her father from arrest by the SS, the family’s escape from Germany to Holland only to arrive the same night the German troops invaded Holland, and successfully hiding Kouguell’s Jewish mother, which enabled the family to survive the remaining six years of the war.

Kathi Kouguell is collaborating with the Aliento Chamber Players to combine this installation with a live performance of Olivier Messiaen’s Quartet for the End of Time with Mary Towse-Beck, piano; Dorothy Braker, cello; Karen Luttik, clarinet; and Alexander Romanul, violin. In this collaboration, Ms. Kouguell will narrate parts of her father’s letter between the eight movements of the Quartet, while slides of the installation are shown throughout the performance. Composer Messiaen wrote the Quartet while interned in a German prison camp; it premiered in Stalag VIII-A in Gorkitz, Germany on January 15, 1941, to a rapt audience of about 5,000 prisoners of war and prison guards.

Kathi Kouguell’s presentation with the Aliento Chamber Players concert is April 10 at 7:30 pm. Exhibit hours are Tuesday through Fridays 9 a.m. to 2 p.m., and runs through April 15 at the Stratham Community Church, 6 Emery Lane, Stratham, 772-3389.
