What follows are photographs I have taken on my visits to Israel, which I offer as a visual journey to mark Israel's 63 years. I hope

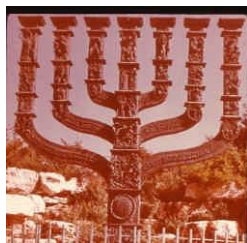
that these pictures give you a sense of the landscape of Israel, past and present.



The grave of Theodore Herzl in Jerusalem. He had a vision of a Jewish home-

land....somewhere...that eventually came to fruition.

The Knesset Menorah, a gift to Israel from members of the British Parliament in 1956, depicts scenes of Jewish history and demonstrates the power of the symbolism of light in our heritage.



The Ashkenazic "Haari" Synagogue in Safed, named for Rabbi Isaac Luria, who left his mark on Jewish mysticism

and our continuing search for spirituality.

The replica of the Liberty Bell in Jerusalem, serving as a reminder of the importance of maintaining true freedom as a value to preserve and for which we must always struggle.



Hakotel Hama-aravi—the Western Wall— is a place for contemplation and for expressing a sense of hope for the future. I am still drawn to this place whenever I visit Israel.

The grave of Yitzhak Rabin, two months after his funeral. His hopes for peace are, as yet, unrealized.



Israeli president Shimon Peres spoke to my rabbis' tour in 1996 when he was Prime Minister following the assassination of Rabin. I remember him once saying that he

is a "conditional dove," an apt description for the views of many Israelis.

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu (then opposition leader in 1996) spoke to us about the importance of security, a theme that remains



the centerpiece of his approach to Israeli foreign policy. I have always found his talk that day to be crucial for understanding his perspective.



Israeli leader and prolific writer Abba Eban spoke to my rabbis' convention in 1988 about "sharing the land" being es-

sential to coexistence with neighboring Arab nations. His assertion that Israel could "take care of itself no matter what borders it has" remains at the heart of what might be a final peace agreement.

The grave of Chanah Senesh on Mt. Herzl in Jerusalem. Her words still re-



mind of us what is important in life, whether in Israel or anywhere in the world: "O God, my God, I pray that these things never end: the sand and the sea, the rush of the waters, the crash of the heavens, the prayer of the human heart."

May the prayers of our hearts express hopes for a peace that will come soon in the Middle East and throughout the world.

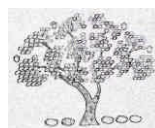

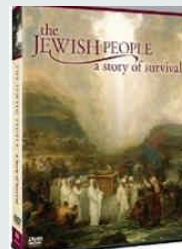
